

21: General architectural description:

Oriented to the south, this cabin rests on a dry-laid, rubble-stone foundation. The original core of the building consists of round-hewn logs, with square-morticed corners. Additions to the front (south) and rear (north) elevations are covered in unpainted, square-cut wood shingles, except for the east and north elevations of the rear addition, which have unpainted, vertical board-and-batten siding. Windows are generally 4-light, with yellow-painted wood frames. Those in the original cabin open as awning windows. Most of the rest are either sliding or fixed. The principal doorway opens west of center in the front elevation. It hosts a brown-painted paneled wood door, opening behind a green-painted, wood-frame screen door. The doorway provides access to an unsheltered wood deck. Another doorway opens in the east elevation of the north addition. It hosts an unpainted, paneled wood door, opening behind an aluminum-frame storm door. The doorway provides access to an unsheltered patio. Another doorway, providing access to a storage or utility room, opens in the extreme north end of the east elevation. Brown sheets of aluminum cover the front-gabled roof. The log perlin ends are exposed. The rafter ends are also exposed but capped by a fascia board.

23. Landscape or special setting features:

This property is located within a canyon, at the base of the ridge rising to the north, at an elevation of around 8,600 feet above mean sea level. The property rises upward from south to north. This property is situated on Eldorado Avenue, the principal east-west thoroughfare through the village of Eldora. Setbacks vary greatly on Eldorado Avenue, with this property having a relatively shallow setback. Grasses cover the property, with a row of spruces lining the east elevation of the house.

24. Associated building, features or objects:

PRIVY (Chemical Toilet/"Oedifice Rex")

A privy hosting a chemical or vault toilet is located directly northeast of the cabin. Oriented to the south, the building rests on a concrete slab. The walls consist of unpainted, vertical board-and-batten siding. A plywood door, with a wood frame, dominates the front (south) elevation. Approaching the doorway from the south are wood steps, flanked on the

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east by a wood railing. A 1-beside-1-light, sliding sash window, with a brown aluminum frames, opens in the center of the east elevation. Brown sheets of asphalt cover the shed roof, and the rafter ends are exposed but capped by a fascia board.

29. Construction history:

According to Boulder County Assessor records, this cabin was constructed in 1909. However, this date was based a 1949 estimation that the cabin was then 40 years old. Legal records indicate that it was probably built in 1901. An analysis of the style, materials, and other historical records corroborates a 1901 date of construction date. The building originally consisted of just the log box. The frame additions to the front and rear elevations were completed at the same time, around 1934, based on a 1949 assessor's card. The only other modifications since then have been the installation of the front deck and the construction of a small addition to the rear elevation. They date to after 1997.

35. Historical background:

The original owner of this cabin, constructed in 1901, appears to have Edith Simpson, who lived in Teller County at that time. Simpson purchased the property from Eldora pioneer and mine owner John W. Gilfillan. By 1906, Boulder County had seized the property and Gilfillan repurchased it. This cabin does not appear to have been his residence but instead a rental unit. He sold the cabin and lots in 1913 to Harold Trunk.

Harold Friedley Trunk was born on September 14, 1893, in New Albany, Indiana. By 1900, he had moved with his family to Denver, where his father was a pharmacist. By 1917, he was working as laborer for the Mills Orchard Company near Maxwell, California. Harold Trunk died on April 5, 1965, in Fresno, California.

Trunk's period of ownership is uncertain. However, by 1937 the Boulder County Treasurer again seized this property, selling it to Ruthanna E. McCoy. She owned the property immediately east, at 375 Eldorado Avenue (5BL.10474). McCoy retained the eastern lot (39) while selling the lot with this cabin (38) a few days later to Carrie J. Douglass. She already owned Lot 37, to the west. Carrie Douglass was born around 1867 in Pennsylvania. Her husband, John A. Douglass, was born around 1865 in New York. They were married around 1889 and had two sons, Earl B. and Rizpah A. Douglass. John Douglass was a railroad agent in Lincoln, Nebraska. It was the Douglasses who gave the cabin the name "Nebraska." Carrie Douglass died around 1953, when her estate transferred the property to her sons, Earl and Rizpah.

In 1956, Edward F. and Bertha Hennessy purchased this property from Earl and Rizpah Douglass. Edward Hennessy was born around 1880, in Iowa. His wife, Bertha, was also born in Iowa, around 1886. They were married around 1912 and had a daughter, Ann E. Hennessy, born around 1912 in Iowa. Edward F. Hennessy was a supervisor for the telephone company, residing by 1930 in Griffith, Jefferson County, Colorado. In the 1940s, the family operated Eldora's Log

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Cabin Grocery & Market, at the northwest corner of Eldorado Avenue and 6th Street. Edward died around 1961. In 1979, Bertha transferred this property to her granddaughters Ann E. Moss, Mary E. Moss, and Martha A. Wood. By 1992, Mary Moss was the sole owner. Three years later, she sold the property to Rodger O. Bowman, a step cousin of current owner Kathleen Pierson. She purchased the property, along with her husband's William D. Pierson Trust, on June 11, 1997. The Piersons remain the current owners and use this cabin, rechristened "Butter 'n' Eggs," for additional guest housing for their own cabin immediately west, at 399 Eldorado Avenue.


