21: General architectural description:

Oriented to the west, this Modern Movements style home rests on a concrete foundation. The rectangular-shaped house features painted asbestos siding. The house has a flat roof with overhanging eaves which slopes upward slightly toward the front of the house; it is covered in built-up rock. The façade is divided into three bays. The northwest portion is painted pea green and features a single pair of what appear to be double hung windows. A metal awning, painted rusty red, caps this window. The central bay extends slightly from the other two portions of the façade and is painted gray. This part of the house contains a large picture window with a patchwork pattern of fixed pane lights. Another painted metal awning caps this window. The primary entry is located within the center bay and faces south. It is reached via three concrete steps up to a slightly recessed stoop with a decorative iron railing. The door appears to be lightly stained wood. The storm door is metal with decorative metalwork. The southwest portion of the façade is painted pea green and features a single-car attached garage; the garage door is painted rusty

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red. There is a shiny metal round support post at the corner of the roof near the garage door.

The southern elevation of the house was partially obscured by a tall privacy fence, however, two openings (one may be a secondary entry) are visible; the front portion of the elevation is painted pea green while the rear portion is gray. The northern elevation is painted gray. It has two rectangular, horizontally oriented slider windows and an opening filled in with glass block. The privacy fence blocks the view of much of the east (rear) elevation from the public right of way. The he southeast corner of the home is painted gray and features a pair of double-hung windows. There is also a rear covered patio.

According to Larimer County assessor records, this building contains two bedrooms and one bathroom. Character-defining features of the Modern Movements style home at 106 N. Washington Avenue include the horizontal orientation, flat roof, and large picture window.

35.	Historical background: The original owners of the house at 106 N. Washington Avenue were Elmer E. and Frances O. Widger. Elmer, better known as Pete, was born on February 24, 1914, in Fort Collins, where he lived his entire life. He served in the Army Air Force in the European theater during World War II. He and Frances Olsen were married on September 2, 1951. Elmer owned the Silver Grill Café, located at 218 Walnut Street, for over fifty years. His wife worked as a secretary at the Poudre Valley National Bank. He passed away, in Fort Collins, on April 16, 1996.
	The home transferred from the estate of Frances O. Widger to Stanley Curtis Hanson in 1998. Hanson sold the property to James L. and Vernelle W. Homan in 2001. James is president of Cygnus Cybermetics Corporation, a consulting firm. Vernelle passed away in January 2008 and James sold the house later that same year to current owner Jack Jewell. He is a State Farm insurance agent.

42. Statement of Significance: Architecturally, this house represents a Modern Movements style building. Character-defining features of the home include the horizontal orientation, canted flat roof, and large picture window. The choice of paint colors and house number enhance the modern appearance of the house. According to the Colorado Office of Archaeology and Historic Preservation this resource is eligible for individual listing in the National Register of Historic Places and the Colorado State Register of Historic Properties (Criterion C: Architecture). This resource also qualifies for listing as a Fort Collins Landmark.					
Cons by the to the	Assessment of historic physical integrity related to significance: structed in 1954, this Modern Movements style house exhibits a high level of physical integrity relative to the seven aspects of integrity as defined the National Park Service and the Colorado Historical Society: location, setting, design, materials, workmanship, association, and feeling. Changes the paint colors do not adversely impact the integrity of this resource. The building retains sufficient physical integrity to convey its architectural ificance for listing on the National Register, State Register, and as a Fort Collins Landmark.


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SKETCH MAP
