



Project Area

Project Area

- Western half of the northeast quarter of Section
 36, Township 1 south, Range 72 west
- Tungsten quadrangle
- Approximately 80 acres

Research Design and Methods

Overall Project Goal

Acquire preservation planning information about selected resources in the Wondervu area.

Project Specific Goals

- Develop an historical and architectural context about a little-researched area.
- Intensively survey 45 selected properties.
- Determine individual property eligibility for National Register, State Register, and Boulder County Landmark.
- Determine contributing/non-contributing status of properties related to any potential historic districts.

Scope of Work

- A. Survey
 - 1. 45 properties (architecture and history)
- B. Products
 - 5 draft forms with photos for County and CHS/OAHP review
 - 2. Submit remaining draft forms, photos, and survey report
 - Submit USGS 7.5-minute quad map plus a planning map
 - 4. Submit final forms, report, and photographs

Scope of Work (continued)

c. Meetings

- 1. Continuously consult with Boulder County staff
- 2. Meet with CHS/OAHP to discuss methodology
- 3. Present to Boulder County HPAB at beginning and end
- 4. Present final results to community
- 5. Consult with CHS/OAHP concerning eligibility
- D. Reports
 - 1. Submit three progress reports

File Search and Previous Work

- Only three properties had been previously surveyed in all of Section 36
 - Beland Cabin, 33442 Coal Creek Canyon Drive

Hayner Residence, 59 Circle Road

Stroud Cabin, 149 Wonder Trail

- No property eligible for listing in the National Register, State Register, or as a Boulder County Landmark
- No historic districts

Methods

Fieldwork

- Capture geographical data, architectural information and photographs
- Conduct oral history interviews when possible
- Archival Research
 - Recorded property records
 - Obituaries
 - Census data
- Form Completion
 - Colorado Cultural Resource Architectural Inventory Form (OAHP 1403)

Determination of Significance

- Individual field eligibility for listing in National Register, State Register, or Boulder County Landmark
 - Must meet at least one criterion
 - Generally must be older than 50 years
 - Must have adequate physical integrity
- Determination of district eligibility



Historical Context


Wondervu: The Workingman's Mountain Retreat

Thesis

- Wondervu developed as an affordable mountain resort for the working class
 - Subordinate theme: Wondervu was marginal place, always between the law and jurisdictions. Its residents also tended to be people living marginal lives
- Two distinct eras of development:
 - Little Cabin and Big Views, 1920s-1930s
 - Modern Pioneers, 1940s-1970s

Geographical Anomaly

- An appendix of Boulder County with no direct highway access without going through Jefferson or Gilpin counties
- Part of the larger Coal Creek community, with portions in Jefferson, Boulder, and Gilpin counties
- Border between Boulder and Gilpin counties, at the west end of Wondervu, is an "indefinite boundary."



Denver & Salt Lake (Moffat Road)


- Penetrated South Boulder Creek and Coal Creek canyons
- Opened the area to tourism and permanent settlement
- Mountain resorts developed at station stops
 - Miramonte
 - Pinecliffe
 - Carter Lake (required grueling carriage ride from Crescent)
- Hilltop locations remained relatively inaccessible



Wondervu: Late to the Scene

- The development of Wondervu was dependant of the development of two related innovations
 - Improved roads
 - Affordable and reliable automobiles



Section 36: Terra Incognito


- In 1875, the U.S. Congress set aside two sections in every township "for the support of the common schools."
- In the early 1920s, the federal government sought to reclaim unsold school sections.
- Western states maintained the school sections belong to the states.
- Assistant Colorado Attorney General Otto Friedrichs brought the state's cause before Congress.
- □ States given clear title in 1927.


Otto Friedrichs: Father of Wondervu

- Born August 3, 1895, to German parents in Brooklyn, New York
- Worked as a legal stenographer and court clerk
- Arrived in Denver with his parents between 1917 and 1920
- Attended a special program at the University of Denver and admitted to bar on November 1, 1920
- Served as Assistant Attorney General under William Boatright (served 1925 to 1928)

Otto Friedrichs: Father of Wondervu

- In 1925 bought section 36 from the State of Colorado
- Probably knew of the place because of his wife, Helen, who grew up on Rocky Flats
- Sells off all but the northeastern quarter of the section
- Plats the original Wondervu Subdivision in 1925-1926
- Contracts Gerald F. Stevens and Mary Harrison Stevens to sell the lots


G.F. Stevens: Working-Class Connection


- Champion of workers' rights, avowed progressive socialist, and labor agitator
- Twice ran to represent Colorado in U.S. Senate
 Progressive Party (Bull Moose Party)
 - Farmer-Labor Party
- Indicted in the deadly Denver Tramway strike riot of August 6, 1920



Wondervu Project

- Original Wondervu Subdivision appears to have been unsuccessful and Friedrichs ended his relationship with Stevens
- Around 1930 Friedrichs plats the northern section of his landholdings as "Wondervu Project"
- Hires Charles E. and Mary A. Hollingsworth to sell lots
- □ The effort proves very successful







Wondervu Covenants


- All deeds contained strict restrictions concerning the use of water and sanitary disposal.
- Gave the developer generous rights to access properties at any time.
- Forbade ownership and use of Wondervu properties by any person who was not "white."

Wondervu Race Restrictions

- Original contract: "All deeds shall contain provisions...that the use of the land shall be restricted to mountain homes for white persons, with a reversion clause."
- Every deed from the Wondervu developers to the first buyers included this restriction.
- Race-exclusive covenants rare in the mountains.
- □ Big question: Why were they necessary?
 - Simply a business decision
 - Based on personally held racial biases

Race Restrictions: Business Decision

- Building lots would have been affordable for minorities/people of color.
- Friedrichs needed to guarantee the investments of people who had very little disposable income as the economy tanked (entering the Great Depression).
- Wondervu was close to Lincoln Hills.
 - African-American resort
- Presence of Emily Griffith in Pinecliffe



Race Restrictions: Personal Bias

- The Golden area was a hotbed of Klan activity.
- Friedrichs served as assistant to Colorado State Attorney General William Boatright, the KKK's candidate for the position.
- Friedrichs was a member of organizations with ties the Klan during the 1920s.
- Race-exclusive covenants were questionably constitutional, and Friedrichs probably knew this.
 Colorado's "Reconstruction" constitution
 - Chandler v. Ziegler, 1930

On the Other Hand...

- Few could achieve elected office in Colorado in the 1920s without overt Klan support.
- Boatright ruled against the KKK on several important cases.
- In 1976, Otto and Helen Friedrichs funded the creation of a mural, Justice Through the Ages, at the new Colorado Judicial Center.


Included many people of color





The Workingman's Resort

- Working-class families originally owned almost all of the surveyed properties
- Included farmers and ranchers, industrial employees, clerks and secretaries, and various craftspeople
- All cabins were extremely modest, generally not exceeding 500 square feet as originally built and often lacked rustic ornamentation (e.g. fireplaces)
- Village lacked a lodge or community gathering place





Exurban Community

- With the improvement of the highway, water and sanitary access, and utility infrastructure, more people live in Wondervu and work in Denver.
 Highway 72 paved between 1948 and 1955
 - In 1951, Otto and Helen Friedrichs move their permanent residence from a posh Monaco Boulevard house to a Wondervu cabin.

Wondervu Architecture

- All built between
 1930 and 1955,
 most in the 1930s
- 2. Very small and unornamented
- Mostly minimal Rustic style
- 4. Many still-functioning privies













Results

Wondervu Survey Results

- Surveyed 45 properties
- Created over 350 pages of geographical, architectural, and historical information
- Generated 225 photographs
- 2 properties (4.4 percent) eligible for the National Register and Colorado State Register
- 8 properties (17.8 percent) eligible as Boulder County landmarks
- No identified historic districts


